

Fellowship Program Marks CSUN's Vibrant Research

Fellows Will Have Opportunity to Engage in Compelling Research, Creative Activities

Citing the university's move into more advanced degree programs and its "increasingly vibrant research focus," Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Harry Hellenbrand has announced the creation of the first California State University, Northridge Research Fellows program.

The program affords honored fellows the opportunity to pursue compelling research or creative activity during the 2008–09 academic year. Fellows will have a reduced teaching load during the year, but will continue committee and service activities.

Emerging from a competitive selection process that began in fall 2007, the first Research Fellows in the program include Vicentiu Covrig of the College of Business and Economics; Owen Doonan of the Curb College of Arts, Media, and Communication; Adele Eskeles Gottfried of the Michael D. Eisner College of Education; Xiyi Hang of the College of Engineering and Computer Science; Lindsay Hansen of the Oviatt Library; Rick Mitchell of the College of Humanities; Suzanne Scheld of the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences; and Ben Yaspelkis III of the College of

Health and Human Development.

"Faculty here do a tremendous amount of research and creative work that enlightens, delights, and enriches," said Provost Hellenbrand. "Such pursuit of knowledge is a good in itself, even as much of it is practically useful. We want to recognize these achievements."

The best way to do that is to link the research program to the library, said Hellenbrand. "Even in the age of the Web," he said, "we depend on the library for the organization of knowledge so that, as scholars and artists, we can add to it."

With this new program for tenured and tenure-track faculty, said Library

Dean Sue Curzon, the exceptional range and diversity of research and creative activity on the campus will be highlighted. Importantly, said the dean, the Research Fellows program will provide faculty with new opportunities to contribute to their fields of study. "All of society benefits," Curzon said, "when new knowledge is generated."

Fellows will report the results of their research or creative activity to their deans and to the provost. Once a year, the Oviatt Library will host a colloquium in which the fellows will share their work with the campus community.

Faculty committees reviewed proposals for the projects, which reflect a diverse field of scholarship:

Vicentiu Covrig (*Finance, Real Estate and Insurance*). Covrig will study how U.S. and foreign professional money managers suffer from the behavioral biases of overconfidence and "herding," the concerted movement of large investor groups into or out of a security based on fear. His will be the first systematic examination of non-U.S. investors' behavior. *New Fellowship Program continued on page 2.*

Creator of Smith & Hawken Catalog Giant Brings Green Ideas to 'Speak Your Mind' Event

The man who created Smith & Hawken, the \$75 million catalog and retail company said to have changed the course of American gardening, is also the co-author of "Natural Capitalism: Creating the Next Industrial Revolution," an environment-meets-entrepreneurism

study that former President Bill Clinton has called one of the five most important books in today's world.

The same man founded or co-founded several groundbreaking natural food companies dedicated to sustainable agricultural methods.

Paul Hawken, trailblazing environ-

mentalist/entrepreneur/social activist/author, will bring his several personas to Cal State Northridge for a 12:30 p.m. Speak Your Mind series lecture Thursday, March 13, in the Plaza del Sol Performance Hall, University Student Union. In his remarks, the renowned activist will examine the

worldwide movement for social and environmental change.

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Business Students Get a Career Boost from Ernst & Young

Firm to Create Career Advancement Center for CSUN Accounting, Information Systems Students

Cal State Northridge alumni and friends of the university, all professionals from Ernst & Young LLP, will match a \$500,000 gift the firm has made to the College of Business and Economics. Through the gift and the \$500,000 from Ernst & Young personnel, the university will receive in excess of \$1 million over the next five years.

The funds will be used to establish the Ernst & Young Center for Career Advancement, which will provide career counseling and placement services to more than 1,300 students in CSUN's College of Business and Economics who are pursuing careers in accounting and information systems.

"This takes CSUN's accounting and

information systems program to a new level of excellence and significantly enhances our students' profile within the upper echelon of the accounting profession and business community," said William Jennings, college dean. "It is particularly meaningful to have CSUN alumni who are Ernst & Young professionals become stewards to the next generation, helping our students see firsthand their own potential."

The Ernst & Young Center for Career Advancement will offer advice and support specifically tailored to those students seeking careers in accounting and information systems. The Ernst & Young Center's offerings will include career coaching, resume writing, interviewing and job search

skills training. It also will provide placement services, including career days, on-campus interviews, an online job and resume database as well as a Web site and placement assistance in internships and full-time positions.

The Ernst & Young gift also will establish the Winter Accounting Internship Program, which will enable students to participate in a full-time internship during the school year. The program will allow participating students to continue to accumulate academic credits toward their degrees by funding faculty to teach them accelerated upper-division accounting classes.

Further cementing the relationship between the professional services

firm and the university, two Ernst & Young partners have agreed to teach tax and audit courses at CSUN.

Additionally, the firm has committed to fund up to five "Ernst & Young Tax Fellows" at Cal State Northridge annually. The fellows will receive funding for their master's degrees in taxation, as well as mentoring and additional scholarships.

"We are excited to provide CSUN with these critical resources," said Ernst & Young Vice Chair Peter Griffith. "We have been extremely happy with the quality of CSUN students and are looking forward to having even more of them join our firm in the years ahead." ■

Owen Doonan (Art). In addition to organizing an international workshop in Turkey on the archaeology of ancient Greek Miletus and its colonies, Doonan will edit volumes on the archaeology project he leads in the Black Sea region, a "Dictionary of Black Sea Antiquity," and will expand the catalog for the CSUN exhibition, "Post-Colonial Arts of Tunisia," into a major publication.

Adele Eskeles Gottfried (Educational Psychology and Counseling). Recognizing high school course selections as a "gateway" to student success, Gottfried will use a longitudinal study from elementary school through college to examine the hypothesis that academic intrinsic motivation, achievement and parental involvement positively impact course selections and academic attainment.

Xiyi Hang (Electrical and Computer Engineering). Using sophisticated microarray technology, Hang will develop and apply to the diagnosis of cancer an important new "machine learning-based classifier" of genetic data from cancerous and normal cells. The accuracy of cancer diagnosis depends greatly on the selected classifier, Hang said.

Lindsay Hansen (Oviatt Library). Hansen will pursue her research in the former East Berlin, conducting

personal interviews with Volkmar Andra and Peter Wicke, pivotal popular music figures during the Cold War. Hansen also will investigate the production of *Weisses Gold*, an important work about the history of porcelain.

Rick Mitchell (English). Mitchell will write and "workshop" a new, full-length play called "Anthropology." Through the plight of an anthropologist embedded in Iraq, the play will theatrically examine cultural differ-

ences and historical conflicts related to the Iraq War and—significantly—the battle over the control of scientific knowledge and technology.

Suzanne Scheld (Anthropology). In light of China's much-debated presence on the African continent, Scheld will produce two papers: one exploring the political, economic and socio-cultural underpinnings of Chinese landownership in Senegal, and another on the emergence of racial discourse as a response to China in Senegal, class conflicts and related contradictions.

Ben Yaspelkis III (Kinesiology). In his research on diabetes, Yaspelkis will utilize two rodent models of insulin resistance (high-fat diet induced vs. genetic) to assess why insulin action in skeletal muscle is impaired. He then will determine whether aerobic or resistance exercise can reverse the defects in skeletal muscle insulin signaling. ■

Their classes to hear Hawken, credited with creating bridges between business and the environment. The lecture will not be open to the general public.

Hawken's latest book, "Blessed Unrest: How the Largest Movement in the World Came Into Being, and Why No One Saw It Coming," will be available for free to the first 30 students attending the lecture. "Blessed Unrest" takes a comprehensive look at agents of environmental change, from billion-dollar nonprofits to single-person causes, all of which comprise what Hawken calls "the largest movement on earth."

Planned by campus-wide representatives, the lecture will be followed by a 1:30 p.m. question and answer session for students, faculty and staff in attendance, after which Hawken will sign copies of "Blessed Unrest." The book, said famed primatologist and United Nations Ambassador for Peace Jane Goodall, is an inspiration for millions to "take action" on the environment.

The Speak Your Mind series was launched in 2006 to challenge student assumptions, stimulate critical thinking and promote informed views on topical, important issues. The series' discussion theme for the 2007-08 academic year—the environment—debuted in October with scientist Stephen H. Schneider's standing-room-only address on global climate change.

Hawken, presently CEO of PaxIT, an engineering and intellectual property licensing company focused on cooling technologies that reduce noise and energy, also is executive director of the Natural Capital Institute, a small research group that works with groups interested in social justice and environmental restoration.

"Growing a Business," another of Hawken's half dozen books, was the basis of a 17-part series on the Public Broadcasting System.

KCET's Huell Howser at Oviatt's Travel Exhibit

Exploring the rich diversity that marks a traveler's life, Cal State Northridge's Oviatt Library has opened a new exhibition, "Wish You Were Here: Travelers from Antiquity to Modern Times."

The show, on display in the C.K. and Teresa Tseng Gallery in the west wing of the library, runs through August 1.

Huell Howser, host of KCET's acclaimed "California's Gold" travel show, will help celebrate the exhibit's

subject matter with a presentation scheduled for 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 4, on the first floor of the library's west wing. Howser will discuss his adventures exploring California, followed by a question and answer period, a reception and an exhibit viewing. Seating is limited.

University special collections curator Tony Gardner, who organized and installed the exhibition, said the show explores a variety of travel's aspects, from modes of transportation to travel journals and the evolution of travel guide books, from the time of antiquity to the early 1900s.

"Since antiquity, curiosity about the known world has compelled the adventurous to travel," Gardner said. "Over time, they have set out by foot, carriage, ship and train to reach their destinations. Their own travel accounts guided others who followed."

The exhibition chronicles travelers' adventures in Europe as well as Africa, Latin America and the Middle East. Sections of the show are dedicated

to traveling in California, with a special highlight on experiences in Yosemite.

"Wish You Were Here" was made possible by a generous gift from Gus
