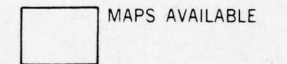


INDEX TO MAPS OF

**ORDER BY STOCK NUMBER**

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THE STOCK NUMBER is a 15-character, alphanumeric identification, constituted as follows:

1. The series number (5 characters). When the series number is less than 5 characters, an X is entered as the 5th character.
2. The sheet number, or name (8 characters).
  - a. Roman numerals are converted to Arabic.
  - b. If map identification is by name instead of number, those letters beyond 8 are omitted.
  - c. If sheet number or name is less than 8 characters, an asterisk is entered in each unused space.
3. The edition number (2 characters). An edition number less than 10 is entered as the 15th character, preceded by a zero in the 14th space.

SERIES DESCRIPTION

**TYPE:** Topographic, 6 colors.  
**FORMAT:** 8° N-S x 12° E-W with exceptions to accommodate land area; Projection International Map of the World Polyconic.  
**SYMBOLS:** Standard.  
**SOURCE:** Prepared by TOPOCOM from the best available topographic map sources, ranging in scale from 1:50,000 to 1:1,000,000 sources for special features such as vegetation, roads, and airfields compiled from special-subject maps for most current information; some sheets are GSGS editions containing names corrections by Directorate Military Survey, London.  
**CHARACTERISTICS:** International, major administrative boundaries delineated; relief by contours at 200 meter intervals and spot heights in meters; cities and towns classified by importance; roads classified as paved or motorable, railroads by gauge; vegetation shown as forest, tree savanna, or grassland; drainage features shown as perennial or intermittent and include wells, classified as permanent or temporary, marsh, mangrove, ricefields, and land subject to inundation, features relating to arid areas include sand, wadis, sebkhas, dunes, rock outcrops, and irregular terrain.
