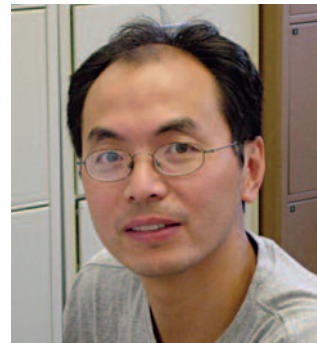

campus' 25th anniversary celebration.

More than 40 groups are planning individual reunions, including those affiliated with former Associated Students presidents, Homecoming Courts, cheerleaders, Granny Girls, the Matador Marching Band, the Black Student Union, athletic teams, fraternities, sororities and various academic departments.

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Metrolink Train Victim Grateful to CSUN for Support

Admissions and Records Employee Bea Watts Returns to Work on Part-Time Schedule

It started out a normal day for Bea Watts. The 42-year-old administrative support coordinator caught the Metrolink train home looking forward to her birthday celebration on Sunday. She had enjoyed her two months riding the train because it offered the mother of three a little solitude and peace.

But the ride turned tragic Sept. 12 when Watts was among the 135 people injured after the Metrolink passenger train collided with a Union Pacific freight train in Chatsworth. Twenty-five people died including CSUN student Aida Magdaleno and alumna Beverly Mosley '99 (*Speech Communication*).

"People see me and say 'you look great, you look fine' but I have scars inside and out," said Watts, who returned to work part-time March 19. Her spleen was crushed, pancreas shattered, back fractured and she developed an aneurysm in her neck. She spent nearly a month in the hospital.

"I nearly died," said Watts, who was able to get off the wrecked train with the help of co-worker Eric Forbes,

director of admissions and records. Forbes' neck and leg were injured. He stayed with Watts until her

husband, Paul, arrived. Watts called her husband, who owns a business in Chatsworth, to tell him a "final goodbye." He was able to find Watts in the rubble and with the help of their Simi Valley neighbor, an off duty firefighter who stopped to help victims, got Watts on a helicopter to a hospital.

"I was surrounded by a lot of angels that day," Watts said. She is also grateful to co-workers who continue to express their love and support to her. She had more than a year of catastrophic leave donated. Others sent her gift cards for meals and household items.

"I just really want to thank everyone," said Watts, who experiences anxiety and is moving "slower" than before the accident. "I try to keep a positive attitude."

University Club Celebrates a Trio of Anniversaries

Founders Celebrate the Club's 40th Birthday, CSUN and the University Corporation's 50th Anniversary

At a gala celebration honoring a trio of anniversaries, D.G. "Gray" Mounger, assistant vice president of alumni relations, welcomed university officials and University Club founders to a special event recognizing the club's 40th birthday and the fruitful partnership shared by Cal State Northridge and The University Corporation for 50 years.

The celebration coincided with CSUN's observance of its 50th anniversary.

"The University Club is a place about people," said Mounger, who served as president of the club for many years. "Those who helped build it, the many that have provided it with leadership and we who continue to enjoy it."

The club was founded in 1967-68 by faculty who used a combination of money from their paychecks, bank

loans and collateral from mortgages to purchase the first building materials for the facility. The group pitched in according to their talents, doing everything from pouring foundation to putting up drywall.

Rick Evans, executive director of The University Corporation, said the club has a rich history of serving the campus and community. He saluted founding faculty members in attendance including Betsy Stelck, Charles Bearchell, Max Lupul, DeWayne Johnson, John Lawrence, Duane Doty, Helen Bennett and Owen Smith, noting that pieces of their original handiwork still remain, adding to the building's lore and patina.

President Jolene Koester also applauded the club's founding faculty. She said their commitment to the campus made the club possible "instantiating the true spirit of the

university in their willingness to not only fund the facility but pour its foundations."

Marcella Tyler, long-time board member and three-time president, speaking on behalf of all former club presidents, dedicated the event to the founding members.

"It is our privilege to have shared in the camaraderie and collegiality that resulted from their tenacity," said Tyler.

Today, the club continues to serve as a gathering place for faculty and staff and expanded its outreach to the community. It is open to the public for a drop-in lunch or for a pre-arranged catered event or meeting.

The corporation has hired a new club manager and catering supervisor. Attendees were treated to a taste of a scrumptious menu of international cuisine. A dessert buffet and chocolate fountain held center

stage at the event.

Stelck, a member of the CSUN University Women's Club, said the women's club donated the patio years ago with the understanding that they could use the facilities as long as the club existed.

"We still play bridge here once a month free of charge," she added.

Johnson, a Pulitzer Prize winning *emeritus* journalism professor, recalled that the faculty who built the original facility had a good time.

"Lots of different disciplines came together and it all flowed nicely," said Johnson. "We demonstrated the same American know-how that helped win World War II, the ability to come to an unknown environment and use tools to successfully build something." ■

deans and to the provost. Once a year, the Oviatt Library will host a colloquium in which the fellows will share their work with the campus.

Faculty committees reviewed proposals for the projects, which reflect a diverse field of scholarship:

Robert Conner (*Manufacturing Systems Engineering and Management*) will research processing and mechanics of engineering materials, particularly amorphous alloys and amorphous alloy composites. His research may be used in medical applications.

Julie Gainsburg (*Secondary Education*) will study the mathematical development of engineers, from entry into an undergraduate university program

to the level of experienced engineer. Her work may be used to "inform" K-12 mathematics education.

Victoria Jaque (*Kinesiology*) will study the physiologic markers of a mitochondrial DNA sequence variation associated with migraine and common functional disorders (chronic fatigue, irritable bowel syndrome and depression). Her research may help in understanding the causes of these disorders, while also describing additional physiologic manifestations of these disorders related to mitochondrial dysfunction.

Daisy Lemus (*Communication Studies*) will focus on understanding communication about retirement from employees' sense-making processes

to the ways behavior affects retirement experiences. She intends to use her research to generate publications and assist in hosting a retirement planning fair for low-income participants.

Luiz Mendes (*Oviatt Library*) will assess faculty practices and perceptions related to the creation of learning objects and participation and contribution to the learning object repository for the organization of learning objects.

Yifei Sun (*Geography*) will research urban and economic geography. He will examine technology, innovation and urban and regional economic development in China. His goal is to determine how global and local networks affect technological

innovations in Chinese industrial enterprises.

Nayereh Tohidi (*Gender and Women's Studies*) will study the women's movement under the Islamist regime in Iran and its role in the process of democratization and secularization of the Iranian society. The strategies and tactics of women's activism in present Iran will be analyzed within the historical and geopolitical context of today's Iran from a "glocal" (global-local interplay) perspective.

Ardavan Asef-Vaziri (*Systems and Operations Management*) will research the operational, economical and environmental feasibility of integrating a logistic hub into Southern California's freight transportation network. ■

CSUN, San Fernando Valley Gets New Area Code

Starting on April 18, the San Fernando Valley will have two area codes: 818 and 747. Current telephone numbers within the 818 area code will not change, but individuals will have to

dial 1-818 or 1-747 preceding the seven digit phone number.

If a caller dials a number without 1-818 or 1-747, the call will not be completed. However, three-digit numbers such as 911 will work the same as before.

Callers dialing from a campus phone must dial 1-818 when dialing to an off-campus phone within the 818/747 area code. For now, CSUN will remain within the 818 area code.

Devices that use seven-digit dialing, such as life safety systems,

fax machines, alarm or security systems and individual speed dial numbers will require reprogramming for the new dialing procedures.
